

Davidson students explore the liberal arts curriculum in depth and enjoy close faculty collaboration. With 1,900 students, the college is large enough for a diverse and invigorating intellectual engagement, but small enough to foster individual experience and opportunity.

Davidson offers over 850 courses and supports 26 majors and 17 academic concentrations. Students may participate in pre-law, pre-medicine, pre-dentistry or dual-degree engineering programs or may design their own independent study classes or interdisciplinary majors.

Students may also apply for funds to support research and travel, and many opportunities exist for summer research positions with Davidson faculty.

Personal relationships with professors and classes limited to 15 students allow for the development of creative, collaborative relationships resulting in a unique academic experience.

Through a historic decision made by the college community and Board of Trustees, The Davidson Trust meets 100 percent of demonstrated financial need of accepted students through a combination of grants and campus employment, without relying on loans.

In support of the college's longstanding commitment to need-blind admission, The Davidson Trust makes it possible for talented students from all backgrounds to imagine coming to Davidson, and for graduates to plan for their futures based on their interests and passions.

Davidson was the first liberal arts college in the nation to establish this type of program, in part because affordability of education has always been a priority for the college. Davidson's founders were determined to keep the cost of education within the reach of many in our land, who could not otherwise obtain it. The Davidson Trust helps realize that historic goal, and through it, sustains a diverse academic community united by intelligence, curiosity, courage, ambition, and character. By ensuring access for all students, Davidson keeps faith with its past

and secures its future.

In 2012, Davidson alumnus and long-time supporter Edward L. "Ted" Baker '57, bequeathed the college a \$25-million gift in support of The Davidson Trust.

Davidson landed 207 student-athletes on the Atlantic 10 Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll for the 2015-16 academic year.

23 rhodes Scholars

Davidson counts 23 Rhodes Scholars amongst its alumni. Established by the late Cecil Rhodes in 1902, the prestigious scholarship provides support for study at England's Oxford University for students from around the world who are outstanding intellectually and show qualities of moral leadership and social purpose.

ncaa puBlic recognition a.WARDS

The NCAA formally released Public Recognition Awards for the sports teams achieving the highest level of academic performance in Division I, and the list included 14 Davidson College athletic programs.

The most recent APR scores are multi-year rates based on scores from the 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12 and 2012-2013 academic years. This announcement is part of the overall Division I academic reform effort and is intended to highlight teams that demonstrate a commitment to academic progress and retention of student-athletes by achieving the top APRs within their respective sports.

"This national acknowledgment is a tribute to the efforts of our tremendous student-athletes and the faculty and coaches who tirelessly guide them as they seek success in both academics and athletics," said Davidson Director of Athletics Jim Murphy. "We are very proud of them all."

Led by Davidson's 11 programs honored, a total of 39 Southern Conference teams representing nine member institutions earned the accolade. Davidson was one of six schools to have multiple programs honored, and accounted for seven of the 19 SoCon women's teams honored and four of the 20 men's SoCon programs acknowledged. Including Davidson, four schools had at least one men's and one women's program honored while the Wildcat baseball, wrestling, women's soccer and volleyball teams were the lone league representatives in their sport.

A variety of options and opportunities set Davidson apart, including its strong Honor Code, commitment to community service and Division I athletics:

- Davidson's historic and student-administered Honor Code offers both the freedom and responsibility of self-scheduled and unproctored exams.
- With the Dean Rusk International Studies Program, 12 Davidson-directed study abroad programs and off-campus study programs in 17 locations worldwide, more than 70 percent of students graduate with experience abroad.
- Davidson fields 21 NCAA Division I varsity teams, with athletes' graduation rate at over 90 percent, just a few points higher than the rest of the student body. Davidson's scholar athletes are well known for having the heaviest luggage of any team on the road—bags full of books and notes.
- Davidson's alumni are committed to the mission of the college with 60 percent of alumni donating to college every year for the past 11 years.

afforda Bility

Davidson is a national leader on affordability initiatives, with needblind admission and meeting 100 percent of demonstrated financial need with a combination of grants and student employment. In a groundbreaking initiative known as the Davidson Trust, Davidson was the first liberal arts college to eliminate the loan component in financial aid packages.

Davidson believes that its educational offerings should be affordable for every admitted student, regardless of a family's financial means. Thanks to Davidson's commitment to need-blind admission, a student's character, accomplishments and academic potential are the only factors in the decision—not ability to pay.

Belk Arena, which seats 5,223 for basketball, has been the Wildcats' home since they started playing again in 1992-93.


In addition to the 5,223-seat John M. Belk Arena, the complex includes the Carl and Louise Knobloch Tennis Center, Cannon Natatorium, Dickson Administrative Wing and Finley Education Center, plus the Charles W. Parker Wrestling Room, a weight room, sports medicine center, four racquetball courts and one squash court. It also houses the athletic department offices.

Named in honor of the late John M. Belk '43 — a former captain of the Wildcats' teams, a Davidson College trustee for more than 15 years and former mayor of Charlotte.

In 2011-12, Davidson had its best season ever at home. The Wildcats went a school-record 12-1 and rattled off a sevengame win streak to start the year. It marked the ninth straight winning season on their home court.

AN ENHANCEMENT TO THE BAKER SPORTS COMPLEX



On Sunday afternoon, Nov. 15, 2015, Davidson College held a ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony for the \$13.3 million dollar Harry L. Vance Athletic Center.

The Vance Athletic Center, which is an enhancement to Baker Sports Complex, was made possible, in part, by a \$4 million challenge gift from Samuel and Ann Ginn of Hillsborough, Calif., to honor Ann's father, the late Harry L. Vance, Davidson College Class of 1926.

The 50,000-square-foot space provides two practice courts for Davidson's men's and women's basketball teams and the volleyball team. This additional gym space helps alleviate the growing needs of Davidson's


club and intramural programs, as well. Also located in the new center are coaches' offices, administrative space, locker rooms, team rooms and film rooms for men's and women's basketball.

Davidson's burgeoning dance program also benefited from the new Cheryle Williamson Center for Dance, which will support academic and co-curricular dance activities. This space was made possible by the generosity of Cheryle and Joel Williamson '67 of Chicago, Ill.

The overall Davidson fan experience is enhanced thanks to a new game day entrance easily accessible from the parking lot and a new ticket office and lobby highlighting athletic accomplishments that includes the Nisbet Hall of Fame. The facility also features the Red Ventures Athletic Club.



Jim Murphy, Director of Athletics

Jim Murphy was introduced as Davidson College's Director of Athletics in November of 1995, returning to his alma mater to lead the Wildcats on the eve of their 100th anniversary of intercollegiate athletics and into the next century.

Prior to his appointment at Davidson, Murphy, spent 10 years as executive associate athletic director and chief financial officer for the Georgia Tech Athletic Association.

An Atlanta native, Murphy played football and baseball during his freshman year at Davidson. His experience has been invaluable as he guides a program which is unique in its desire for excellence in both athletics and academics and has one of the smallest enrollments among NCAA Division I schools.

Reflecting his support of academics, Davidson's NCAA graduation rate of 91 percent was the highest in Division I in 2001-02, second in 2002-03 with a rate of 97 percent and continues to be above 90 percent each year.

Davidson claimed the Southern Conference Graduation Rate Award for the last 12 years. In addition, Davidson won the SoCon's Barrett-Bonner Award, given to the school that places the highest percentage of its student-athletes on the league's academic honor roll, 19 times in the award's 21-year history.

Since Murphy's return to Davidson, the Wildcats have pursued several major capital projects and major improvements have been completed in Belk Arena and at Smith Field at Richardson Stadium.

The construction of the Belk Turf Field for field hockey, the new Alumni Stadium for soccer, Wilson Baseball Park and practice facility and the football stadium expansion project, which included a state-of-the-art weight room, a new press box and additional permanent seating, all have come during Murphy's tenure. Davidson also replaced Richardson Stadium's natural grass with FieldTurf, which allows the Wildcats to practice in their home stadium on a daily basis and frees up field space for intramural use. In October, construction to the new Harry L. Vance Athletic Center - an enhancement to Baker Sports Complex - began, with an expected completion in approximately 12-14 months.

In May of 2013, Murphy and Davidson College President Carol Quillen announced that the Wildcats will join the highly-competitive Atlantic 10 Conference, a move that became a reality on July 1, 2014.

The 2004 NACDA Division I-AA/I-AAA Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year, Murphy served two terms on the prestigious NCAA Division I Management Council, a policy-making body within the NCAA governance structure. He chaired the Division I-AA Governance Committee and formerly served on the NCAA Division I Business and Finance Cabinet, the Division I Governance Committee and the Division I Finance Committee.

From 2002-04, Murphy chaired the Athletic Directors Association of the Southern Conference. He was part of Charlotte's successful bid to host the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championships in 1999 and 2000 and also served as Tournament Director of the first and second-round games of the 2005 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship in Charlotte.

Murphy is a past member of the Division I Football Issues Committee and Past-President of the Football Championship Subdivision Athletic Directors Association. He was also a member of the NCAA Task Force on Recruiting, an 18-member panel charged with changing the culture of recruiting in intercollegiate athletics, and currently serves on the NCAA's Fiscal Responsibility Oversight Group.

A licensed Certified Public Accountant and 1978 graduate of Davidson with a degree in economics, he earned a Master of Science degree in management

from Georgia Tech in 1979. He worked from 1979-85 as an audit manager with the international public accounting firm of KPMG Peat Marwick in Atlanta with responsibility for financial statement audits of public and private companies with up to \$1 billion in assets.

Murphy has been active in the community since his return to Davidson. He is involved with Social Venture Partners - Charlotte, chairs the Board of Managers of the Lake Norman YMCA, the Board of Directors of the Charlotte Regional Sports Commission, served three years on the Board of the Charlotte Council for Children and three years on the Board of Directors of the Town of Davidson Youth Baseball League.

Murphy is married to Dr. Susan Roberts, a political science professor at Davidson, and his son, Matt, is a graduate of the University of North Carolina and works in advertising in Chapel Hill, N.C.

Carol Quillen, Davidson President

Carol Quillen has led Davidson College in reimagining the liberal arts experience, creating a new model for higher education in an increasingly interconnected world.

Davidson students gain a

deep and rich liberal arts education now strengthened by skills that will enable them to adapt and thrive amidst continual shifts in the economy and around the globe. Graduates step into the world equipped to lead in the service of something larger than themselves.

Quillen's "Transition to Impact" initiatives and her support of student-and-faculty collaborative research allow students to produce new knowledge, whether working with scholars in the classroom or entrepreneurs in the community.

She has affirmed Davidson's commitment to educational excellence by cultivating partnerships that help identify students from all backgrounds whose talents enrich the community and whose leadership as graduates will transform the world.

On August 1, 2011, Quillen became the 18th president of Davidson College.

A respected scholar and an accomplished administrator, she arrived at Davidson from Rice University, where she served as vice president for international and interdisciplinary initiatives.

She grew up in New Castle, Delaware, a small town where she says "it was second nature to support the community and look out for other people."

Quillen attended Wilmington Friends School. She earned a B.A. in American history from the University of Chicago, graduating Phi Beta Kappa with special and general honors, then

received a Ph.D. in European history from Princeton University.

Quillen has been tapped to lend her passion and skills to national efforts on college access and affordability. She was appointed to President

Obama's Advisory Council on Financial Capability for Young Americans.

On the Davidson campus, she emphasizes that equal educational opportunity must be real and meaningful. Through The Davidson Trust, the college practices need-blind admission and meets 100 percent of demonstrated need for all students through a combination of grants and campus employment, with no packaged loans.

Quillen serves on the board of directors of the American Council on Education, the National Alliance of Public Charter Schools, the Levine Museum of the New South, and the National Humanities Center.

Her daughter, Caitlin, is a graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Coats Fulks came to Davidson from Wake Forest University, where she spent the five years as an assistant coach under Jen Hoover. The last two years (2015-16 & 2016-17) Wake Forest earned at-large bids to the Women's NIT, reaching the second round both seasons during Coats Fulks tenure.

During the 2016-17 season, the Demon Deacons went 17-16 overall and earned a win over Bethune-Cookman in the first round of the WNIT before falling to Middle Tennessee State to end their season. Guard Alex Sharp became the second student-athlete under Coats Fulks to be named to the Atlantic Coast Conference All-Freshman Team, joining fellow teammate Ariel Stephenson who garnered the award a year ago from the Blue Ribbon Panel and the league's coaches.

In addition to helping the Demon Deacons to consecutive NIT appearances the last two seasons, Coats Fulks was recognized during the 2015-16 campaign as one of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association's (WBCA) Thirty Under 30 honorees. The award is given annually to up-and-coming coaches 30 years old and younger, to recognize their involvement in community service, mentorship and impact on others' professional manner and attitude as well as association involvement

While on the bench for head coach Hoover for five seasons, Coats Fulks assisted in all aspects of the program, from academics to recruiting, where she served as an integral part to the Demon Deacons putting together ranked recruiting classes each year on staff.

In her first season with the Deacs, she helped guide one of the top-scoring back-courts in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Point guard Chelsea Douglas led the team in scoring at 14.6 points per game, while Lakevia Boykin was right behind her at 14.4 points. The two combined to make

134 three-pointers on the season, with Douglas' 72 ranking as the third-most for a single-season in school history.

Coats Fulks joined the Wake Forest staff after one season as an assistant coach at UNC Greensboro in 2011-12. Coats Fulks broke into the coaching ranks at Longwood University, where she was on staff from 2007-11. In her first season with the Lancers, they went 16-13, notching the program's best win total in its Division I era at the time.



ro Byn Scherr-Wells assisant Coach first year Michigan '01

Robyn Scherr-Wells enters her first season as assistant coach, joining the Davidson women's basketball staff in June of 2017.

Scherr-Wells joins the Wildcat staff after having compiled a 144-83 overall career record in seven seasons as a head coach at Roosevelt University in Chicago, Ill., and Davenport University, which is in Grand Rapids, Mich. She was even more impressive in conference games, going 76-26 at the two schools to go with three regular season and conference tournament championship titles.

"I am thrilled to be joining the Davidson staff and to be a part of such an esteemed academic institution," said Scherr-Wells. "Coach Coats Fulks is going to be very successful in building Davidson into a consistent A-10 contender and I am excited to be a part of it. I can't wait to get to work with our staff and the talented women on our team."

For the past two seasons, Scherr-Wells led Davenport to a combined 59-10 record and two Wolverine Hoosier Athletic Conference regular season and tournament titles. This past year, she was named Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan 2017 College Coach of the Year. The Panthers offense ranked amount the best in the nation under Scherr-Wells, finishing third and 11th, respectively, the past two years.

In addition, Scherr-Wells recruited and coached seven WHAC All-Conference, two all-freshmen, and two all-defensive team selections, as well as one NAIA All-American. She also coached 12 All-WHAC Academic Team members and one CoSIDA Academic All-District player, while nine Panthers were named Daktronics-NAIA Scholar-Athletes.

Prior to her two-year run at Davenport, Scherr-Wells was the head coach at Roosevelt for five seasons, putting the program on the national radar. she built the program from the ground up and compiled an overall record of 85-73.

In just the program's third season of existence, she guided the Lakers to Chicagoland Collegiate Athletic Conference regular season and tournament titles, marking the school's first-ever conference crowns. The team earned a spot in the NAIA Division II Women's

Basketball National Championship, where the Lakers advanced to the Sweet 16. Scherr-Wells' squad finished the year with a school-record 28 wins while ranking No. 10 in the final national poll.

Scherr-Wells ensured the Lakers were not a one-hit wonder, posting 21 wins, rising as high as No. 5 in the national rankings and making a return trip to the national tournament the following year. That season concluded a historic run for her inaugural recruiting class, a group featured two-time NAIA All-American and four-time All-CCAC honoree Casey Davis, who tallied 2,203 career points.

She garnered numerous accolades while at Roosevelt, including a two-time Illinois Basketball Coaches Association (IBCA) NAIA Division II Coach of the Year (2013, 2014). In addition, Scherr-Wells also was named Chicagoland Collegiate Athletic Conference (CCAC) and Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) Region IV Coach of the Year following the 2012-13 campaign.

A native of Glen Ellyn, Ill., Scherr-Wells played on the No. 2 team in the nation in 1995 as a member of the AAU Illinois Hustle and went on to the University of Michigan where she joined the women's basketball team. With the Wolverines, Scherr-Wells started as a manager/practice player during her freshman season and eventually earned an athletic scholarship as a sophomore for her role in that capacity for the squad.

Following graduation, Scherr-Wells played for Athletes in Action during their tour of Spain in 2001 before heading to the University of Arizona where she served for three years on the campus ministry staff for Athletes in Action, working closely with the student-athletes and coaches. In 2005, she returned to the University of Michigan to be the administrative assistant for the women's basketball team, serving in various capacities with the team under the mentorship of Missouri Sports Hall of Fame Coach Cheryl Burnett.

After one year in Ann Arbor, Mich., Scherr-Wells headed to the northwest, becoming the assistant women's basketball coach at Portland State. With the Vikings during the 2006-07 season, she coached the perimeter players and helped develop rookie Claire Faucher into the Big Sky Conference Most Outstanding Freshman. Scherr-Wells also served as the academic coordinator for the team, handled all team travel, scouted opponents







The 2016-17 season marked Davidson women's basketball program's third year in the Atlantic 10 as they finished up the program's 38th year.

Individually, the senior trio of Rachel Piles, Kayla Seymour and Melanie Ransom finished out their careers with nice senior seasons.

Below are just a few of the Wildcat highlights throughout the campaign.

Preseason Honors For Latt

The annual Atlantic 10 Women's Basketball media day saw junior Mackenzie Latt earn preseason honors. The rising junior was named to the preseason third team, the first program's first player to earn preseason honors.

First Time Opponents

Davidson's non-conference schedule had four new opponents it faced for the first time in program history. The 'Cats faced Western Michigan on the road, then UCF at home before taking on Toledo and Idaho State at the Cancun Challenge.

It's the most first-time opponents Davidson faced in a year since it took on 10 during the 2014-15 season, the 'Cats

first year in the Atlantic 10.

Latt Named to the All-Riviera Division Team at Cancun Challenge

For her outstanding two games at the Cancun Challenge, Mackenzie Latt was named to the All-Riviera Division Team. The junior averaged 15.5 points and five rebounds a game vs. Toledo and Idaho State. She scored a season-high 16 points against the Bengals in Davidson's final game of the holiday tournament.

Cancun Challenge

For the first time in the program's history, the Wildcats traveled outside the United States as they took part in the Cancun Challenge, Nov. 24-25.

Davidson faced Toledo and Idaho State for the first time, dropping both contests. Against the Rockets, Latt paced the team with a game-high 15 points, while freshman Andrea Robinson crashed the glass for a game and seasonhigh 12 rebounds.

The following day vs. Idaho State, Davidson's valiant comeback effort fell just short against Idaho State in a 70-58. Trailing by as many as 20 (45-25) in the third quarter, Davidson twice got within single digits but a late 9-0 run by the Bengals halted the Wildcats' efforts. Mackenzie Latt again paced the Wildcat attack with a season-high 16 points, 14 of which came in the last two quarters when the 'Cats were making their comeback. Fellow junior Chloe Johnson netted a season-high 13 points, draining 3-of-5 shots from downtown.

The duos point totals each tied their career highs. The win was Davidson's seventh in the past nine meetings vs. the Paladins and 15th in the last 21 overall.

Latt finished the game canning a career-high 11 field goals on 17 attempts and added a team-best eight rebounds. Speight's five three-pointers were a career high and she set a new personal best with seven rebounds.

Justine Lyon gave Davidson three double-digit scorers with 12 points and matched Speight with seven boards. Rachel Piles came off the bench to pull in six rebounds and pocket a career-best four steals, while Chloe Johnson dished out a career-high nine assists.

Davidson as a team had 19 helpers on their 26 made field goals. In addition, the Wildcats' point totals of 24 and 28 in the first and fourth quarters were season bests, while it set a team season best with seven blocks and tied a season high with 45 rebounds.

Welcome to the 1,000-Point Club

Junior Mackenzie Latt became the latest Wildcat to reach 1,000 points, Jan. 7, at Duquesne. Latt is the 19th player in program history to hit the special mark after she nailed a long jumper in the second quarter for her 1,000th and 1,001 career points. She went on to finish with 18 points, while adding 11 rebounds for her fourth double-double of the season.

It marks the 10th year in the past 11 that a Wildcat has scored 1,000 points for their career. Last year saw Dakota Dukes reach the milestone to become the 18th player

Under head coach Michele Savage, it is her sixth 1,000-point scorer she has coached.

Seeing Double

Mackenzie Latt, who 11 times as a freshman recorded a double-double for the fifth-most in a Wildcat single season since 1992-93, picked up her sixth double-double of the season at George Washington, Jan. 15, to push her career total to 19. She finished with a 21 points to go with 10 rebounds.

Davidson Nets First A-10 Win of Season Sophomore Justine Lyon hit the 20point mark for the third time this year and junior Chloe Johnson hit the go-ahead bucket to help lead Davidson to its first Atlantic 10 win of the season with a 58-54 decision over visiting George Mason, Jan.

Tied at 54-all with 53 seconds left,

Johnson drove down the lane with the shot clock running down and hit a layup with 26 ticks left for a 56-54 lead. The 'Cats added two free throws to seal up the

Lyon drained 9-of-17 shots on her way to a game-high 22 points. Mackenzie Latt finished with 14 points, seven rebounds and a career-best six steals, while Johnson added nine points.

Lyon, 'Cats Down UMass on the Road For Second A-10 Win

Sophomore Justine Lyon scored a career-high 34 points and Davidson secured its second Atlantic 10 win by holding off UMass in a 63-59 road win,

Lyon topped her previous career best from earlier this season by four points, scoring 20 of her 34 in the first two quarters, and helped seal the win by scoring eight of Davidson's final 10 points in the last two minutes. She finished a careerbest 9-of-12 from the charity stripe, all coming in the last quarter, while shooting 11-for-20 from the floor overall with a trio of three-balls.

Davidson led for over 35 minutes of the game, holding off the Minutewomen after they tied the game at 43-all in the fourth quarter by using a quick 7-2 run to go up five and never looked back.

Lyon Reaches 30 Again

Justine Lyon's stellar sophomore campaign continued as the sophomore reached the 30-point mark for the second time this season, going off for a career-high 34 points at UMass, Feb. 4. She hit for 20 of those points in the first and second quarter combined. Lyon tied her careerhigh with 11 made field goals on 20 attempts and set a personal best at the charity stripe by going 9-for-12, all coming in the fourth quarter.

The pair of 30-point outings is the first time dating back to 1992-93, when the women's basketball program was restarted, that a player had twice reached that mark in a single season. Jennifer O'Brien had three 30-point games spanned over four seasons (1996-2000). The last player to hit for 30 points in a season was Dakota Dukes at Wofford, March 2, 2014.

Outstanding Week Gives Lyon A-10 Co-Player of the Week

Justine Lyon was honored by the Atlantic 10 by being named the co-player of the week, Feb. 6. She shared her first collegiate weekly honor with George Washington's Caira Washington. It was also Davidson's first-ever weekly honor in its three years in the A-10.

The Durham, N.C., native had a stellar week in leading Davidson to a 1-1 record, averaging 28 points and 4.5 rebounds a game, while shooting a solid 54.3 percent. She also canned 5-of-13 three-balls and went 13-for-20 at the charity stripe, while adding three assists, two blocks and four steals.

Piles hauled in a team-high seven rebounds to go with a block and three steals. Ransom in her first career start scored eight points and dished out three assists, while Seymour hit a personal-best 4-of-9 shots for a season-high eight points and assisted on four other baskets.

Davidson pulled away with a 15-6 run that spanned the final 2:10 of the third quarter and went to the 6:17 mark in the fourth quarter. Capping the rally off was six straight points by Ransom to turn a 50-43 lead into a 65-49 advantage.

New Season Highs Set in Win Over the Rams

In Davidson's win over Rhode Island, Feb. 11, a 74-64 victory at home, it hit a few new team season highs. The Wildcats 27-point outing in the second quarter topped its previous high by four, while they hauled in a game-high 47 rebounds.

In addition, the 'Cats were very unselfish with the ball, dishing out 25 assists on 30 made field goals to top its previous high of 20 assists vs. High Point. Finally, they used the fast-break to their advantage, matching a season-high with 20 points, which was set vs. High Point earlier this season.

Another 20-Point Outing for Lyon

Sophomore Justine Lyon registered her ninth 20-point outing this year going off for a game-high 25 points at VCU, Feb. 21. The sophomore scored 11 of her points in the four quarter.

Eight of her 20-point outings have come in league games this season. Three times she has gone off for 22 points in games against Fordham, George Mason and Dayton.



"The Atlantic 10 is a conference that gives Davidson the opportunity to be associated with and compete against institutions with significant profiles, both academically and athletically, while we continue to establish our national brand. This is a great opportunity to use athletics to further the goals and objectives of the college as we enhance the experience of our students," said Director of Athletics Jim Murphy.

The geographic footprint of the Atlantic 10 Conference covers eight different states and the District of Columbia for a total population of 75.3 million people (2010 Census). The move will allow 19 of Davidson's 21 sports to compete in the A-10, with the exception of football and wrestling. Football will remain in the Pioneer Football League which hosts non-scholarship programs, while wrestling will seek to continue its affiliation with the Southern Conference.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va.— The Atlantic 10 Conference officially welcomed Davidson College as its 14th member Tuesday, just over one year after the A-10 Council of Presidents unanimously voted to formally accept the school's application for membership. A prestigious private institution in Davidson, N.C., the Wildcat athletic program sponsors 19 of the Atlantic 10's 21 championship sports.

Located just north of Charlotte within the Atlantic 10 footprint, the Wildcats have a tradition of excellence in intercollegiate athletics led by men's basketball, a successful women's basketball program and strong Olympic sports programs. On March 2. 1975, the idea of what is now the Atlantic 10

Conference was conceived. What started as an eight-school, men's basketball-only affiliation has grown into a 14-university, 21-sport league that is universally hailed as one of the best conferences in the country, and celebrated its 40thanniversary in 2015-16.

That growth and prominence is a direct result of the ideals and commitments of the member institutions of the Atlantic 10 - Davidson College, The University of Dayton, Duquesne University, Fordham University, George Mason University, The George Washington University, La Salle University, University of Massachusetts, University of Rhode Island, University of Richmond, St. Bonaventure University, Saint Joseph's University, Saint Louis University and Virginia Commonwealth University.

The Atlantic 10 was proactive in navigating sweeping conference realignment over the last few years, adding Davidson College, George Mason University and Virginia Commonwealth University. The additions have proven successful with all three institutions winning regular season and tournament championships. The league continues to draw national praise for its decisions during conference realignment in selecting strong academic institutions with basketball-centric, robust athletic programs. The 14 member institutions of the A-10 are united and strengthened by their diversity. Each is extraordinary in its educational mission, whether of a Catholic faith, a private university or a land grant institution. The varied pursuits of each member prove that there are many threads that weave the fabric for a great conference.

The A-10

The Atlantic 10 Conference, with a total population of over 76.5 million people within its geographic footprint of eight states and the District of Columbia, will crown champions in 21 sports this year: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's golf, women's lacrosse, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track & field, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball.

The presidents and chancellors of Atlantic 10 institutions, in conjunction with Atlantic 10 Commissioner Bernadette

V. McGlade, have made a strong commitment to making the academic and athletics equation a successful one. Over the years, the league membership has strived to better recognize the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. The Commissioner's Honor Roll, which cites every Atlantic 10 student-athlete with a 3.5 grade point average or better, recognized 3,029 student-athletes in 2014-15, a record for a 14-team A-10. The league sponsors Academic All-Conference teams in each of its sports and honors two student-athletes as the A-10 Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Moreover, the Atlantic 10 provides \$70,000 in postgraduate scholarships awards to 14

student-athletes, one from each campus.

The Atlantic 10 Conference annually earns high marks in the NCAA Academic metrics. This includes graduating its student-athletes at an 89 percent rate according to the NCAA's most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) figures, five percentage points higher than the national average. There were 90 A-10 teams with a perfect 1000 GSR score in the NCAA's 2014 most recent report. The league also had an average Academic Progress Rate (APR) of 985 in 2015, seven points higher than the national average. A record 60 teams were singled out for public recognition for their APR scores by the NCAA this past spring. There were 51 teams with a perfect APR score of 1000 and another 71 teams that scored a 990 in the 2015 report.

Success on the playing field has mirrored the A-10's classroom prowess, with the league earning NCAA postseason bids in each of its 21 sports, including two men's soccer bids and 11 men's and women's basketball bids in 2014-15. Dayton women's basketball made a run to the Elite Eight, challenging eventual national champion UConn in the process, while VCU baseball advanced to the 2015 NCAA Super Regionals as did Davidson baseball in 2017.

Women's Basketball 2015-16 In Review

George Washington captured its second consecutive conference title after defeating third-seeded Duquesne in the 2016 Atlantic 10 Championship final at the Richmond Coliseum, earning the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. Duquesne, which made its first-ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2016, received an at-large bid and advanced to the second round after defeating Seton Hall. St. Bonaventure also received an at-large bid to the field of 64. The Bonnies defeated Oklahoma State in round one.

At the conclusion of the 2015-16 season. the A-10 was eighth out of 32 conferences in the final RPI rankings. Six teams finished ranked among the top 100 programs, led by Duquesne who finished with the 19th best RPI in the nation.

A-10 NCAA HISTORY

- The Atlantic 10 has had three or more teams in the NCAA Tournament in seven of the last 10 years.
- •In 1989, a league-high four teams represented the Atlantic 10 in the NCAA Tournament.
- •Of the A-10's active members, George Washington boasts the most NCAA Tournament selections with 17 and is followed closely by Saint Joseph's (13).

A-10 WNIT HISTORY

• The A-10 has received at least one bid to compete in the WNIT for 17-straight years. Atlantic 10 teams have compiled a record of 55-69 (.444) in the WNIT after Fordham, Saint Louis, George Washington, Saint Joseph's and Duquesne went a combined 2-5 in the 2016-17 WNIT. The Atlantic 10 has received five bids to the WNIT in seven of the last 10 years.

Saint Louis reached the third round in the 2015-16 WNIT, while GWU reached the third round in 2013-14 with a pair of postseason wins for the first time since 2008.



Parham, Director of Psychosocial Club House, Catawba County Mental Health Services, became the first women's basketball player to be inducted into the Davidson Hall of Fame. She set 18 school records in her four-year career from 1977 through 1980 and she's the only female athlete whose jersey is retired. When she graduated in 1980, Womack's school records included most career points (1,249) and rebounds (601). Ranking ninth in career points, she's the all-time leader in points per game (16.7) and is third in made field goals (556). She holds the single-game record for attempted field goals (32) and ranks third in points per game for a single season at 19.1. She received the Rebecca Stimson Award in 1980 as the college's most outstanding female athlete.

El izaBEt Ha. tannEr, in Du Ct ED in 1997-98

Beth Tanner was the 1978 recipient of the Rebecca Stimson Award for her accomplishments in women's basketball and field hockey. A standout guard on the basketball team, Tanner graduated in 1978 as the Wildcat's all-time leading scorer in women's basketball with 792 points. Tanner also held single-game (10 against Guilford) and season (67 in 1976) records in assists, and the season record holder for steals with 60. Tanner averaged 11.3 points per game in her career from 1974 through 1978. She also at one time shared the single-game record for field goal percentage with .818 (9 for 11) against Catawba in 1974.



JEnniFer r.roos, in Du Ct ED in 2004-05



A three-sport athlete at Davidson, Jennifer Roos excelled at whatever she did. She was an outstanding field hockey player during some of the squad's best seasons, earning the Stimson Award as Davidson's top female athlete to cap her career. As a freshman, she was named the team's defensive MVP. The following year, only one person was honored as the team MVP, and she earned it each of her final three seasons. Roos, a defender, scored nine goals and had one assist as a sophomore, the best offensive output of her career. She was named All-Deep South each of her first three campaigns, plus was All-Southeast Region as a junior.

One of the first field hockey players to be awarded a scholarship, Roos was a member of the lacrosse club team that went 12-3 before the sport was elevated to varsity status the year after she graduated. She was also a key player for the women's basketball team in its first season back as a varsity sport during her senior year. She played the point and was one of two players to start all 22 games. Her 77 assists led the team, as did her 64 steals. She also drained a three-pointer at the buzzer to lift the Wildcats to a 64-62 win over Winthrop.




Davidson's first women's basketball player to be named SoCon Player of the Year (1997), Kirsch ranks second all-time in rebounding (878) and ranks sixth in scoring (1,370 points). The native of Heidelberg, Germany, earned first-team All-SoCon honors in 1997 and was named second-team all-league in 1996. She was named to the conference's academic honor roll twice and was a two-time winner of the Wildcat Award, given to the team's most valuable player. Kirsch led the 'Cats to a 29-23 overall record and two top-5 SoCon finishes in her final two seasons.



JEnniFEr O'BriEn, in DuCt ED in 2010-11

Second all-time scorer in school history with 1,510 points when she graduated, Jennifer O'Brien was named first-team All-SoCon in 1998 and 2000, and earned second-team honors in 1999. She was named to the SoCon All-Tournament Team from 1998-2000. O'Brien owns Davidson single-game records in steals and assists. She owns the school all-time marks for assists (588) and steals (368), and ranks in the top-10 in points per game, field goals made, 3-point field goals, 3-point field goal percentage, free throws and rebounds. She won the Wildcat Award for team MVP honors in 1998 and 2000 and the Rebecca Stimson award in 2000. Davidson posted a record of 61-47 during her four-year career.



Carolyn Kirsch stepped up her level of play as a senior to lead the Southern Conference in scoring (16.3 ppg) and become the first Wildcat to be named SoCon Player of the Year.

The 5-11 guard from Heidelberg, Germany, was also among the league leaders in steals (2.3 spg), field goal percentage (47.7 percent) and rebounding (7.8 rpg) in 1996-97 while guiding Davidson to a then school record 15 wins. She reached the 20-point plateau eight times as a senior, including a team season-best 26-point performance in the 'Cats' 84-65 win over Western Carolina on Jan. 11, 1997.

Sophia Aleksandravicius had a stellar junior campaign, leading the league in rebounding (8.9) and blocks (2.9), while ranking fourth in scoring (13.8), as she was named the SoCon Player of the Year by the coaches. She was also voted the Defender of the Year. Twice Aleksandravicius was named the player of the month during the regular season, while garnering first-team All-SoCon honors on both the coaches and media teams.

The 6-foot-5 forward from Pound Ridge, N.Y., led the Wildcats to a 22-10 record and helped the program capture its first regular season title with a school-best mark of 17-3 in the league. She finished the season scoring in double-digits in 29 games and registering 11 double-doubles.

SOPHia al EKsan Dr aviCius, 2012-13 SOCOn at HI Et E OF t HE YEar, 2012-13

Sophia Aleksandravicius, a three-time All-SoCon First Team pick in her career, made program history as she became the first Wildcat to earn a second Southern Conference Player of the Year honor, while also grabbing the Defender of the Year for a second straight season as she took home both awards in 2012-13. The 6-foot-5 foward led the SoCon in scoring (16.5), rebounding (9.9) and blocks (102- 2.9 per game / 10th in the nation), all career highs.

Aleksandravicius' award-winning season was not done there as she was named the SoCon Female Athlete of the Year, becoming the first female at Davidson to earn the prestigious award and the seventh Wildcat overall. In addition, the senior was honored with Davidson College's Rebecca A. Stimson Award for being the top student female-athlete.

Other accolades during her amazing senior campaign included being named the SoCon Player of the Year by CollegeSportsMadness.com and earning first-team honors. The publication named Aleksandravicius to the All Mid-Major Second Team. The senior was also a Full Court Mid-Major All-America Honorable Mention by fullcourt.com. She was a first-team

SoCon All-Tournament pick after guiding Davidson to the SoCon Championship game for just the second time in program history. During the regular season, Aleksandravicius was a three-time SoCon Player of the Week honoree, and took home the league's player of the month award in January and February to give her four for her career.

It was a record-setting career for Aleksandravicius, who was a two-time SoCon Player and Defender of the Year, and a three-time All-SoCon First Team member on both the coaches and media teams. During her senior year, she set seven school records, including points (1,878), rebounds (1,143) and blocks (339), while also setting six new single-season Wildcat records. The senior is the only women's player, and just the third basketball player at Davidson, to have over 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in a career.

The forward also set a single-game blocks record with 10 on her way to collecting the program's first triple-double, Feb. 16, with 20 points, 10 rebounds and 10 blocks in home win vs. Furman.

Aleksandravicius put her name among the greats in the SoCon women's basketball record book during her four years. She finished ranked in the top-10 all-time in: points (10th), scoring (14.8-9th), field goals (5th), field goal attempts (4th), free throws (9th), free throw attempts (10th), rebounding (4th) and blocks (10-2nd-best single game, 102-2nd-best in single season, 339-1st).

The senior forward wrapped up her stellar career by scoring in double digits 104 times, including 28 20-point outings and a pair of 30-point games. Aleksandravicius registered 56 double-digit rebounding games during her career, with 22 of those coming in the 2012-13 season.

Aleksandravicius led Davidson to its second straight postseason appearance, and third overall, with a trip to the 2013 Women's NIT, where the Wildcats netted the program's first postseason victory. The senior tallied her 50th career double-double, and 20th of the season, with 27 points and 11 rebounds in guiding the 'Cats to a first-round win at Old Dominion, March 21. Her 20 double-doubles ranked 11th in the nation during the season.

Mercedes Robinson was a two-time first-team All-SoCon and All-State pick during her four-year career, 2005-09. She led the SoCon in rebounding her senior season at 9.6 rpg.

Twenty-three wins. A 10-game winning streak. A nine-game road winning streak. Eleven road wins in all. Ten home wins. Those were just a few of the many accomplishments that either set a new school record or tied one.

For all their hard work, Davidson put an exclamation point on their season when they found out Monday, Mar. 12, 2007 they would continue their historic season with the team's first-ever trip to postseason play when it earned an at-large bid to the Women's National Invitational Tournament.

It marked the first time ever the women's team had earned a postseason bid. They were part of WNIT history as for the first time, each of the nation's 31 conferences will be represented in the WNIT. The tournament expanded to 48 teams this year to accommodate an automatic berth for each of the conferences.

Davidson's opponent in its first trip to postseason play was the UAB Blazers. The two schools had faced each other just once, back on Dec. 16, 2001.


Playing in their first-ever postseason game, the senior trio of Jessica Mitchell, Brynn Kelly, and Tia Washington looked to

give the Wildcats their first career postseason win. Mitchell did all she could to keep the Wildcats within striking distance, draining a career-high 24 points by tying her career-best with nine field goals made and hit four of the Wildcats' 10 three-pointers. Three of her four three-balls came in the second half, including one with 14 seconds on the clock to bring the Wildcats within one, 78-77. She also matched her season-high with seven assists.

Kelly was the only other 'Cat in double



figures as she registered her fourth career double-double on 12 points and 11 rebounds. Davidson, as a team, hauled in a game-high 46 boards to win the rebounding margin, 46-39.

Trailing by 11 (67-56) with 8:24 left in the game, Davidson started its rally with a three-pointer from Mitchell on the right wing. The shot sparked a 16-5 run over the next five and a half minutes that saw the Wildcats knot things up at 72-all on yet another three-pointer, this time from freshman Alex Thompson on the left side. Junior Danielle Hemerka also canned back-to-back shots from downtown in the run and finished the contest with eight points, four boards and three assists.

A quick 5-0 run, three of the points coming from the Blazers' Diamond Rogers, gave UAB back the lead at 77-72 with just 36 seconds on the clock.

Davidson charged right back, getting a fade-away jumper by sophomore Kelly Gassie and Mitchell's three-pointer that closed the gap to one (78-77). Rogers and Britney Jones sealed the Wildcats' hopes though, hitting three of four free throws in the closing seconds and Mitchell's last-second three-pointer was off target for the final score of 81-77.

The Wildcats did not get many calls

their way all evening as the fouls were 20-11 and UAB stepped to the charity stripe 25 times (16-for-25) compared to Davidson's six trips (5-for-6).

Davidson used the hot hand of Mitchell in the first half to jump out to an early 11-10 advantage. Mitchell was perfect in the first half, draining all five of her shots from the field, including her only shot from downtown, and had two free throws for 13-first half points. The Wildcats as a team started the contest hitting eight of their first 12 shots, including two three-pointers. They finished the half nailing 15-of-29 shots from the floor for 51.7 percent and closed out the game shooting 44.9 percent.

UAB grabbed the lead back, 12-11, on the next possession on a layup from Shimena Moore and maintained at least a one-point lead all the way into halftime for a score of 39-36.

Sophomore Mercedes Robinson assisted off the bench during the Wildcats' second-half comeback with all eight her points coming in the second period. She also hauled in nine rebounds and picked up one of Davidson's season-high five blocks.





The Davidson women's basketball team made a return trip to the women's NIT after a record - setting 2011-12 campaign. The Wildcats won their

first regular season Southern Conference title with a school-best mark of 17-3, earning the automatic bid into the WNIT. The squad finished with 22 wins, one off the school record, while they rattled off a nine-game winning streak, again one off the 10-game set by the 2006-07 team that made the program's first postseason bid. The Wildcats also set a bench mark with a 12-1 home record at Belk Arena, including a record 9-1 record vs. the SoCon.

The 'Cats took their 22-9 record to Harrisonburg, Va., on Thursday, March 15, for a first-round matchup against the Dukes. It was the first-ever matchup against both teams.

James Madison entered the WNIT with a 24-7 record after reaching the semifinals of the Colonial Athletic Association Tournament. It marked only the second time since 2005 that the Dukes had not advanced to the championship game after winning the last two CAA Championships.

Junior Sophia Aleksandravicius, the SoCon Player of the Year as voted on by the coaches, scored a season-best 25 points and Davidson forced 22 turnovers, but was unable to overcome a 19-7 second-half

run by James Madison in falling 64-49 in the first round of the Women's NIT.

Davidson concluded it season at 22-10, one win away from the school-record, as it made its second-ever postseason appearance. James Madison (25-7) moves on and will play Wake Forest in the second round.

Aleksandravicius finished with 25 points, 17 of them in the second-half when she kept the Wildcats in the game. She added nine rebounds, two assists and two blocks.

Down 24-20 at the break, the junior got Davidson's offense rolling by scoring seven straight points to open the new

stanza, and a fastbreak bucket by Jasmine Calin after she leaked out on the break gave the 'Cats a 29-28 advantage with 14:13 to go. It would be the only lead Davidson had for the game.

JMU would score a quick six points and then continue their run to 10-2 for a 38-31 advantage. The spurt continued all the way out to 19-7 giving the Dukes the lead for good at 47-36 with under five minutes to go.

Lauren Whitehurst led the rally with eight of her 14 total points in the run. The Dukes overall had three reach double figures with Tarik Hislop scoring 15 points and Kirby Burkholder 11, nine of them on treys.

The lead was cut to nine at 49-40 on a layup by Aleksandravicius with 4:23 remaining, but four straight free throws by Hislop pushed the lead back to double digits and the Wildcats got no closer than 10 the rest of the way.

Despite starting the game just 3-for-16 from the field, Davidson stayed within striking distance thanks to its solid defense. The Wildcats forced nine turnovers early and trailed just 7-6 after a driving layin by Sarah Davis.

It became 12-6 after the Dukes' Hislop hit a short jumper, forcing Davidson to call a timeout. The Wildcats though, came right back with two quick buckets from Laura Murray and Aleksandravicius. The 'Cats leading scorer Murray, who came in averaging just under 15 points, was held to seven points for the game.

Aleksandravicius sparked a mini 8-2 run when she rattled off six straight points and Davidson cut a seven-point Duke lead down to one, 21-20, on a Barbara Sitton fastbreak layup off a Murray steal. Davidson ended up causing 14 first-half turnovers and pocketing three steals.

JMU hit its third three-ball of the half for a 24-20 score at the break.

The Davidson women's basketball team made it backto-back postseason years with a return trip to the women's NIT after a very strong 2012-13 cam-

paign. The Wildcats entered the first round of the tournament fresh off reaching the Southern Conference title game and were looking to make history with their first-ever postseason win.

Senior Sophia Aleksandravicius led the charge, dominating in the paint with her 20th double-double to pace four Wildcats in double figures and Davidson won the program's first postseason game with an 82-73 victory on the road at Old Dominion in the first round of the Women's National Invitation Tournament Thursday evening at the Ted Constant Convocation Center.

The two-time Southern Conference Player of the Year Aleksandravicius had 27 points and pulled in 11 rebounds for her 50th career double-double. She went a career-best 11-for-14 from the charity stripe as Davidson hit 20 shots at the line.

Laura Murray (16), Dakota Dukes (season-best tying 15) and Jasmine Calin (season-high 10) also registered double figures in points as Davidson moved to 22-12 on the season.

Barbara Sitton for the second game in a row hauled in double figures in rebounds, pulling in a career-best 11 on the defensive end. She also dished out seven assists and Aleksandravicius and Calin had 11 and eights points, respectively, in the half.

Dukes helped push the lead out 16 (51-35) with six points in the first four minutes of the second half. An Aleksandravicius' and-one play two minutes later gave the Wildcats its biggest lead of the game at 58-40 when she swished home the free throw.

Old Dominion went on a 15-7 run to cut the deficit to 10 (65-55) with 7:48 on the clock. Kelley scored the final seven points of the spurt.

Davidson came right back, pushing its lead out to 74-59 on a pair of free throws from Katrin Chiemeka with 4:06 left and did not allow the lead to slip below 11 the rest of the way until the final score.



pocketed four steals.

Davidson as a team pulled in a seasonhigh 57 rebounds, including a season-best 20 on the offensive glass. It also assisted on 21 of its 29 field goals.

ODU (19-12) put three players in double digits, led by Shae Kelley's 21 points. Stephanie Gardner had 15 and Galaisha Goodhope scored 11. The Monarchs, who had not played in 18 days, shot 40.8 percent for the game.

Davidson took control of the contest with a 17-4 run to close the first half that turned a 25-24 deficit with 9:44 remaining into a 41-29 lead at the break.

After their historic first round win, Davidson was looking for win number two in the women's NIT second round. Their

opponent, cross-county rival Charlotte 49ers.

The Wildcats battled all the way to the end against its cross-county rival, but Charlotte pulled away with a 19-8 run in the final six minutes to capture a 72-60 victory in the second round of the Women's National Invitation Tournament Sunday afternoon at Halton Arena.

Davidson completed its outstanding season at 22-13, which included earning the program's first postseason win in the first round of the WNIT. Charlotte moved to 26-5 and advances to the third round of the WNIT to face the winner of the Florida/Winthrop contest.

Up 53-52, Charlotte broke free from Davidson by scoring 10 of the next 13 points during a five-minute stretch to give itself a 10-point lead with 1:10 remaining. Jennifer Hailey scored seven of those points for the 49ers on her way to a gamehigh 22 points.

A free throw by Sophia Aleksandravicius made it 65-56 with 59 ticks left, but the 49ers sealed up with the win by going 7-for-8 at the charity stripe in the last minute, while the Wildcats were

unable to convert on offense, turning the ball over three times in the last 1:10.

Aleksandravicius capped off her amazing four-year Wildcat career with 18 points and five rebounds. The two-time SoCon Player of the Year finished her career setting seven all-time school records, including points (1,878), rebounds (1,143) and blocks (339).

Fellow senior Jasmine Calin had one of her best games of the season, scoring a season-high 12 points, nine of them coming in the first half. Hannah Early gave Davidson another spark off the bench scoring 13 points.

Senior Barbara Sitton had four points, five rebounds, four assists and three steals in her last game, while Katrin Chiemeka had two points on a pair of free throws.

Charlotte had three other players join Hailey in double figures. Hillary Sigmon and Jai Forney finished with 13 apiece, while Ny Hammonds scored 12 points and pulled in a gamehigh tying nine rebounds.

The 49ers shot 47.1 percent from the floor, including 50 percent in the second half, while Davidson was at 37.1 percent. Charlotte held a 43-31 edge on the boards, with both teams each pulling in 15 offensive rebounds.

The Wildcats erased a fourpoint halftime deficit with an 11-6 run, capped off by an andone play from Aleksandravicius to start the second half and they

had their second lead of the game at 38-37. Charlotte countered though by breaking up a 40-all tie a few minutes later with a quick six for a 46-40 advantage at 11:02 on the clock.

The 'Cats never backed down, getting another three-point play from Calin to make it 50-49 and then when the 49ers had pushed its lead to 53-49, Early struck for a deep trey on the left wing to make it 53-52 with 6:47 left in the game.

Davidson stayed close after the opening tip, getting a driving layup on the baseline by Sitton to make it 8-7. Two triples by Hillary Sigmon doubled the 'Cats up later though at 20-10 with 12:04 left in the first half.

Five straight points, including a threepoint play from Calin, cut the deficit in half a few minutes later.

Then down 28-17 after a pair of Hailey free throws, part of her 13 first-half points, the 'Cats switched to a zone-defense and charged back with a 10-0 run. Sparking the run was six straight points from Early to get within one at 28-27 and under a minute to go. Charlotte took away a little of the momentum with the final three points to end the half up 31-27.






