THE HISTORY OF THE WILDCAT

On November 10, 1917, a small cohort of 22 football players traveled to Atlanta to represent Davidson College against Auburn, one of the most formidable teams in the South. The Plainsmen had massacred their first four opponents, outscoring teams, 141-6.

According to one account, they were "big, quick, and undefeated" and heavily favored in the day's matchup. Davidson was 2-4 and started a line averaging 20 pounds less.

Not surprisingly, Auburn dominated the game, outgaining the "Red and Black" 240 yards to Davidson's 91 yards. Astoundingly, Davidson pulled together an offensive attack through the efforts of running back A.R. "Buck" Flowers and quarterback Henry Spann, delivering a "bewildering array of forward passes."

Davidson defeated one of the most powerful teams in the South that day, 21-7, with scrappiness that captured the awe and respect of Atlanta sportswriters. They wrote of the "Wildcats" from Davidson College, whose small stature and ferocious style proved overwhelming. One account notes that Morgan Blake of the *Atlanta Journal* remarked of the Davidson team, "No other team ever put together in these United States of the same weight as Coach Fetzer's team could ever get the verdict over the flock of wild men from North Carolina."

The *Davidsonian* picked up on the nickname, and it has been used ever since, replacing former, milder references such as "Red and Black," "Presbyterians" and "Preachers."

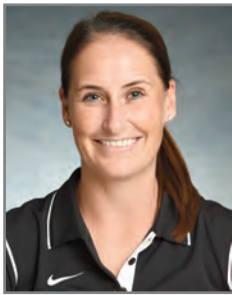

3rd Year at Davidson
UNC '07
Record at Davidson: 30-15

Coach Anundsen O'Leary, formerly Sara Anundsen, enters her third year for the 2016-17 season leading the Davidson women's tennis program after Athletic Director Jim Murphy announced July 11, 2014, she was the new head coach of the program.

O'Leary, who came from a very successful program at North Carolina, took over for Caroline Price, who retired in June of 2014 after leading the Wildcats for 32 years and winning the 1983 NCAA Division III National Championship, the only national title in school history.

The 2016 season was an outstanding one for both O'Leary and the Wildcats. She guided the 'Cats to a very impressive 18-5 overall record and went a perfect 6-0 in Atlantic 10 matches, while reaching the league's championship match for the first time before falling to VCU. The 18-win campaign was the most victories for the program since a 19-win season in 2008, which happened to be the last time they also reached a conference tournament final when they were members of the Southern Conference.

O'Leary also led the Wildcats to an 11-match win streak during the season, which was one away from tying the second longest in program history of 12 in 2005.

For her stellar season, O'Leary was honored by her peers for her excellent season by being named the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year, the first time since 2002 the program was honored with the award. Coach Price won SoCon Coach of the Year three times during her tenure. Anundsen saw three of her players (Anna Catharine Feaster, Ava Todd and Gabrielle Centenari) each garner all-conference honors, with Feaster and Todd being placed on the first team, while freshman Centenari was a second-team member. Senior Elaina Cummer was named to the all-academic team after a great finish to her senior season.

In her first year of being a head coach as well as guiding the program into its first year in the Atlantic 10, Anundsen did not disappoint as she brought her winning touch with UNC to Davidson and had a solid debut. She led the 'Cats to their most wins since 2010, going 12-10 overall on the season and finishing 3-2 in Atlantic 10 play. She led them to their first A-10 Tournament win with a 4-1 decision over St. Bonaventure to reach the quarterfinals. Davidson earned its first-ever A-10 regular season win over George Mason, a 6-1 victory at home, while picking up first-time wins in program history against Arkansas State and Saint Joseph's, while scoring a 4-1 victory against cross-county rival Charlotte.

The Wildcats opened the year strong, winning five of their first six matches, including running off a five-match win streak, which was also the longest since 2010, after falling to nationally-ranked Virginia Tech to open the season. Davidson also performed well on its home courts, going 8-4.

Anundsen saw her freshman class produce one of the most successful seasons in recent history. The quartet of Anna Catharine Feaster, Ava Todd, Ally Sexton and Cassidy Shell went a combined 47-19 in singles action and added another 28 victories in doubles. Feaster and Todd won 19 and 16 singles matches, respectively, and were each honored by the Atlantic 10. Feaster earned A-10 All-First Team and was named the league's rookie performer of the week three times. Todd was just as good, earning a spot on the league's second team with junior Elaina Cummer. She also took home a weekly award four different times. Todd's impressive season included a 16-match win streak, the longest since Kelsey Linville had a 13-match streak in 2005.

In addition, Anundsen's first year was also highlighted by a couple of prestigious honors. She was named to the Colorado Tennis Hall of Fame as part of the Class of 2015 in January. Then during the summer of 2015, Anundsen was one of four coaches

picked to coach the USTA Collegiate National Team. She had the honor to coach Lamie Loeb and Brooke Austin, who finished the 2015 season nationally-ranked No. 3 and No. 4, respectively.

Anundsen came to Davidson from a very successful program at North Carolina. During her four years as assistant coach, Anundsen helped the Tar Heels reach the NCAA Tournament all four years, including this past season when UNC reached its first national championship match before falling in a close 4-3 decision to UCLA.

In addition to capturing the 2014 Atlantic Coast Conference regular season title and finishing third in the ITA National Rankings, the Tar Heels posted a 29-6 record, which was one win shy of the program record set in 2010. Anundsen also coached four players this past year that received All-American honors, including the No. 1 player in the country, Jamie Loeb.

In her first year as an assistant, Anundsen helped the Tar Heels advance to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Junior Sanaz Marand earned All-America honors after advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA singles event. In addition, Marand and doubles partner Sophie Grabinski earned All-America honors for their play.

The 2009-10 campaign was a new high for the program, as the Tar Heels advanced to the national semifinals for the first time in school history. Anundsen earned ITA Carolina Region Assistant Coach of the Year for her efforts as the Tar Heels finished with a school-record 30 wins and an ACC-record 11-0 mark in league play.

The 2011 Tar Heels followed that up with a run to the national quarterfinals as well as the program's first ACC title since 2002. Three Carolina players earned All-America honors and Anundsen was named ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year after earning regional honors for the second straight season.

As a player, Anundsen earned All-America honors in 2006 and 2007, and helped lead the Tar Heels to a pair of Sweet Sixteens and an Elite Eight. A native of Littleton, Colo., Anundsen captured the 2007 NCAA doubles title after falling in the national semifinals in 2006. She and her playing partner finished the 2007 season 29-6 and were named ITA National Doubles Team Of The Year. By virtue of their NCAA title, Anundsen and Long also earned a wild card berth into the 2007 U.S. Open.

Anundsen graduated from UNC with a degree in management and society in 2007. She twice was named to the Dean's List and earned ACC Honor Roll honors three times, while being named to the ACC All-Academic Team twice. During her senior year, Anundsen was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District III Team.

The Davidson women's tennis program begins its third year under the guidance of head coach Sara Anundsen. It was quite a season for Anundsen and the Wildcats last year. She led the squad to a perfect 6-0 Atlantic 10 mark, reaching the championship match for the first time, while the 'Cats had their best season since 2008 with an 18-5 record. The 18 wins were the most since a 19-win campaign in 2008.

This year's club will be looking to take another step toward the program's first-ever league title. Davidson will have to replace Elaina Cummer, who finished her four-year career with a combined 84 wins in singles and doubles, getting 42 each in both positions.

Leading the way is the return of five starters, including A-10 all-performers Anna Catharine Feaster, Ava Todd and Gabrielle Centenari. In all, eight of the Wildcats' nine letterwinners return with the addition of two newcomers, and it all adds up to what coach Anundsen and the Wildcats hope to be another successful season.

SINGLES

A year after collecting 76 singles wins, Davidson one-upped itself by finishing with an impressive 79 wins last year as a team, 22 of which came against Atlantic 10 foes. It was the fourth straight season with 50-plus singles win. Gone is Elaina Cummer, who had a team-best 15 wins, but returning is Ava Todd (14) Anna Catharine Feaster (14), Centenari (13) and Megan Scholvinck (11) all reached the double-digit win total.

• **Senior Jenna Brunner:** The Wildcats' main No. 6 singles player, had a solid 9-1 record at the position and finished junior season 9-2 overall ... went a perfect 3-0 in Atlantic 10 matches, scoring wins over George Washington, Duquesne and Dayton ... ran off a personal-best six-match singles win streak to start the season.

• **Senior Sarah Stein:** Saw action in both singles and doubles, with records of 3-7 and 8-10 on the year ... played mainly No. 6 singles, getting two of the three wins.

• **Junior Anna Catharine Feaster:** The Wildcats' top singles player, named to be the Atlantic 10 All-First Team for the second year in a row ... picked the A-10 Player of the Week on back-to-back weeks in March ... went 14-6 at No. 1 singles ... opened the season winning six of first eight singles matches, with the two defeats coming in three sets ... scored half of 14 wins on the season at home ... rattled off a five-match win streak and a pair of three-match streaks during season ... helped guide Davidson to the A-10 Championship final by winning final three matches against Duquesne, GW and VCU.

• **Junior Ally Sexton:** Did not see any action in singles last year ... has a career mark of 5-5 in singles.

• **Junior Cassidy Shell:** Competed in one singles match during Spring season,

falling to Wingate opponent at No. 6 ... also played at No. 6 vs. UNCG, but that match went unfinished.

• **Junior Ava Todd:** Followed up stand-out first year with another solid second season for Davidson in 2016 ... named to the Atlantic 10 All-First Team ... earned A-10 Player of the Week, March 1 ... it was fifth of career winning a weekly award ... the Wildcats' No. 2 singles player, went 14-6 overall and had a perfect 5-0 league record to move to 10-0 overall in two seasons ... won 12 of 16 matches at No. 2 spot ... ran off a team-high six-match win streak during the season ... won six of 14 singles matches at home ... opened the season winning 10 of first 12 matches.

• **Sophomore Gabrielle Centenari:** Had an outstanding freshman debut for Davidson, earning a spot on the Atlantic 10 All-Second Team ... given the team's Most Improved Award ... tabbed A-10 Rookie of the Week, Feb. 23 ... started out as the 'Cats' No. 4 singles player and moved up to No. 2 in her last six matches ... was third on the team with a 13-7 record, including a perfect 5-0 mark in A-10 matches ... had a season-high five-match win streak on the year, tying for the second highest on the team ... went 5-1 at No. 3 singles ... earned a pair of wins at No. 2 during the A-10 Championship.

• **Sophomore Megan Scholvinck:** Had a nice debut season for the Wildcats, going 11-6 in singles ... tabbed A-10 Rookie of the Week, Feb. 9 ... finished with a 3-1 A-10 record in singles, getting victories over George Washington, Richmond and Saint Joseph's ... played at No. 3-5 position, collecting six of those wins at No. 4, going 6-3 ... had a perfect 4-0 when going to three sets, picking up three of those wins on the road ... scored seven of 11 wins on the road.

NEWCOMERS

• **Freshman Alexandra Abele:** Four-year letterwinner at Sycamore in Cincinnati, Ohio, playing No. 1 singles ... finished runner-up Ohio Division I singles in 2015, third place in 2014 and runner-up in doubles in 2013 ... three-time All-State First Team pick (2013-15) ... sported a 30-5 record during senior prep season, all at No. 1 singles, while finishing runner-up Ohio Division I Singles ... tallied an overall career record of 117-28 overall, going 98-25 in singles.

• **Freshman Samantha Armas:** Played at Kennesaw Mountain High in Acworth, Ga., earning four letters ... named all-county tennis player three times (2013, 2014 and 2016) ... recorded a 17-3 record during senior prep season to finish career with a 64-7 mark ... reached Class 6A State Team Tournament Final Four in 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016 ... four-time Region 4 team champions (2013-2016).

DOUBLES

Davidson's doubles teams finished the 2016 season with 33 wins in 61 matches,

netting 13 of those victories vs. A-10 foes. The Wildcats used 11 different doubles lineups last year, with nine of them playing either at No. 2 or 3 position. They return every player from all three of their main doubles teams.

• **No. 1 position:** Half of the top doubles team return in Stein after the graduation of Cummer ... they went 4-7 at No. 1 and collected six overall, getting a 2-1 mark at No. 2 ... also playing at the top spot was Feaster and Sexton, going 6-4 overall and 3-0 in A-10 matches.

• **No. 2 position:** With a very strong 7-1 record at the No. 2 spot, Feaster and Sexton return and seek to continue their great success together ... they collected a 13-5 overall record, including 6-0 in league matches ... in two years the pair have gone 30-10 in doubles play ... Centenari earned four wins in her six matches with Cummer ... overall, Davidson went 14-6 at No. 2.

• **No. 3 position:** Six different teams were used at the last doubles position, led by Brunner and Centenari's 3-3 record ... Todd picked up four wins, two each with Scholvinck and Stein, while Scholvinck got another two wins with fellow classmate Centenari.

THE SCHEDULE

Davidson will open the season with three straight home matches against Wofford (Jan. 22) and Gardner-Webb (Jan. 28) followed by its first A-10 match against George Washington (Jan. 29). Last year saw the Wildcats go an impressive 8-1 at home and are 16-5 the last two seasons.

The Wildcats will also play host Rhode Island (Feb. 26), Saint Joseph's (March 12), George Mason (March 19) and Richmond (April 15). They scored wins over four of those teams and will be playing Rhode Island for the first time this year.

A few non-conference highlights include traveling to Tennessee, Feb. 3, for a first-time matchup and facing cross-county rival Charlotte, April 8. The Wildcats lead the all-time series vs. the 49ers, 17-13.

Davidson will also face Stetson, East Carolina, and former Southern Conference foes Elon and Appalachian State.

The A-10 Tournament takes place April 26-30 in Orlando, Fla., at the USTA National Campus. Davidson fell to VCU last year in the championship match, giving the Rams its fourth straight league title.

Prior to VCU's four-peat tournament titles, Richmond had won the A-10 Tournament nine of the past 11 years, including four straight years in a row from 2004-2007 and 2009-2012, with Temple winning the other two seasons, 2003 and 2008.

Emily J. Knobloch, Class of 1992-93

Emmy Knobloch '82 was one of Davidson's greatest tennis players ever and Davidson's first female All-American in any sport. She was named first team Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women All-American in 1982 when she finished fourth nationally. She had a four-year record of 86-19 for the Wildcats and led them to AIAW Division II state championships in 1979, 1981 and 1982. She was recipient of the Rebecca Stimson Award as Davidson's most outstanding athlete in 1982. She was captain of the 1982 women's tennis team. Emmy was an economics major from Atlanta and was named to Who's Who Among American College Students.

Rebecca E. Stimson, Class of 1995-96

Stimson '77 compiled an impressive record in the early years of women's athletics at Davidson. Stimson lettered four years in tennis and was named the team's most valuable player in 1977. In addition she earned three letters in basketball and played one season in field hockey. In 1977 she received Davidson's first ever award as the Wildcats most valuable Female athlete. That award is now named in her honor. After graduating from Davidson in 1977 Stimson received her Ph.D. in Chemistry at Northwestern University. Since 1981 she has been at Dupont and is presently Business Manager and Engineering Polymers.



Dana Casner Sterling, Class of 2009-10

Casner Sterling '99 left her mark on the Wildcat women's tennis team during her career, starting with the program's first Southern Conference Freshman of the Year honor in 1996. A four-year letter winner and Davidson's No. 1 singles player all four years, Casner Sterling earned first-team all-conference honors all four seasons. She recorded a 46-33 singles mark and tallied another 32 wins in doubles play at the No. 1 position. Casner Sterling led the Wildcats to winning records in three of her four seasons, with the 'Cats hitting the 12-win mark twice. In addition, Davidson also posted winning conference records in all four seasons and in 1998, advanced to the semifinals of the SoCon Tournament.

Kelly Fillnow, Class of 2015-16

Kelly Fillnow '05 was a two-sport standout star for both the cross country and women's tennis programs during her four-year career at Davidson. As a runner, the Jacksonville, Fla., native was an all-conference honoree and led the Wildcats to their first-ever Southern Conference title as a junior in 2003. On the tennis court, Fillnow is the only player in program history to be named to an all-conference team eight times during her career. She was a first-team pick three times in singles and teamed up with her twin sister Meghan to earn first-team honors in 2004. The Wildcats' No. 1 singles and doubles player all four years, Fillnow finished her career with 71 wins in singles and added another 67 victories in doubles, with 65 of those victories coming with her sister. She hit the double-digit mark in wins all four years in singles and doubles, reaching a career-best 21 as a junior in 2004 in both singles and doubles. Fillnow was just as good in conference matches, finishing with a career singles mark of 24-13 and a record of 25-12 in doubles. Davidson went a combined 68-29 during Fillnow's four years and she helped the Wildcats reach the SoCon Tournament Championship match twice.

Record at Davidson: 422-314

After 32 years of leading the Davidson women's tennis program, long-time head coach Caroline Price announced her retirement in June of 2014. It was a storied career for the former Wildcat great coach as she helped transform the Davidson women's tennis program.

"Davidson is a special and unique place — the place and history and most notably the people," said Price. "It was a privilege to spend my coaching career here, a place where I believe the philosophy of intercollegiate athletics is kept in proper perspective. You get a great education, while doing things you love. When I arrived on campus decades ago, I sensed 'bright futures,' and now as I leave, I continue to see 'bright futures.' Davidson is special and I want to again thank the school and athletic administration for the opportunity to coach the Wildcats. It was such a great honor!"

Price and the women's tennis program had been a staple together dating back to 1983 when she began her exemplary tenure at Davidson. Over her 32 years, Price's career was filled with numerous highlights. She guided the Wildcats to a pair of trips to the NCAA Division III National Championship match, while taking home the 1984 national championship. It's the only national championship title ever earned by a Davidson athletic team. The following year, Price guided the 'Cats back to the championship match on their way to a school-record 21 wins in 1985.

Fast forward a few years and Price went on to earn a Big South Championship title in 1991 and then finished runner-up in 1992. During it all, she registered 22 winning seasons, including nine straight years from 2002 to 2010. During that nine-year run, the 'Cats reached the Southern Conference Tournament final four times and went a combined 150-71, including a 20-6 season in 2005, the second-best ever in school history.

"It's impossible to quantify the impact of Caroline's 32 years in Davidson College Athletics," said athletics director Jim Murphy. "Her love of competition mixed with kindness and caring has yielded lifelong lessons of guidance and growth in her players and those around her. We'll miss Caroline and anticipate her next set of adventures."

Price also smoothly handled a pair of changes to the program during her 32-year tenure. Her first challenge came in 1987 when Davidson began competing at the Division I level without the advantage of scholarships. Despite the lack of funds and the marked increase in competition, Price's teams still managed to garner more wins than losses. It was not until the 1990-91 season, the first time Davidson College offered scholarships to women, that Price was able to offer scholarships to her players.

In 1993, Davidson started competing as a member of the SoCon after a successful two-year stint as a member of the Big

South Conference. Moving up yet another level in competition, the Wildcats responded to the newest challenge by finishing the season 12-5 for a second-place finish in the league. The 'Cats went on to finish 115-88 during their 21-year stay in the SoCon, finishing runner-up in the tournament four times and reaching the semifinals seven times.

During her tenure, Price coached one of the best players in program history in Dana Casner Sterling '99, who is one of four women's tennis players to earn a spot in the Davidson Hall of Fame. Under Price's guidance, Davidson had two SoCon Freshman of the Year (Dana Casner Sterling-1996 and Kelsey Linville-2004) and saw 21 players earn all-conference honors. Of those 21 players, eight of them were repeat All-SoCon picks, including Casner, Kelly Fillnow and Linville, who were each three-time first-team picks in singles, with Casner the only four-time all-league member at Davidson. The twins of Kelly and Meghan Fillnow made the first or second doubles teams all four years, while Virginia Berry and Ashley Maner twice won the SoCon Sportsmanship Award.

Among active Davidson coaches, Price finished with one of the highest overall winning percentages (.573) of any women's team. A three-time SoCon Coach of the Year ('94, '96, 2002), Price concludes her storied coaching career with 422 wins in 736 matches, fourth-most all-time in Davidson athletic history behind hall of fame men's tennis coach Jeff Frank (541), men's basketball coach Bob McKillop (472 as of 2013-14) and baseball coach Dick Cooke (465 as of 2013-14).

JIM MURPHY DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Jim Murphy was introduced as Davidson College's Director of Athletics in November of 1995, returning to his alma mater to lead the Wildcats on the eve of their 100th anniversary of intercollegiate athletics and into the next century.

Prior to his appointment at Davidson, Murphy, 53, spent 10 years as executive associate athletic director and chief financial officer for the Georgia Tech Athletic Association.

Murphy, an Atlanta native, played football and baseball during his freshman year at Davidson. His experience has been invaluable as he guides a program which is unique in its desire for excellence in both athletics and academics and has one of the smallest enrollments among NCAA Division I schools.

Reflecting his support of academics, Davidson's NCAA graduation rate of 91 percent was the highest in Division I in 2001-02, second in 2002-03 with a rate of 97 percent and continues to be above 90 percent each year.

"I firmly believe Davidson represents the ideal in college athletics and think the success of Davidson's students, both in competition and after graduation proves that," said Murphy. "It's true that Davidson needs intercollegiate athletics, but intercollegiate athletics need Davidson even more."

Since Murphy's return to Davidson, the Wildcats have pursued several major capital projects, including the creation of the highly-innovative \$10 million Davidson Scholars Program, and major improvements have been completed in Belk Arena and at Smith Field at Richardson Stadium.

The last five years have seen the construction of the Belk Artificial Surface Field for field hockey, the new Alumni Stadium for soccer, Wilson Baseball Park and batting cages and the football stadium expansion project, which included a state-of-the-art weight room, a new press box and additional permanent seating.

Murphy, the 2004 NACDA Division I-AA /I-AAA Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year, served two terms on the prestigious NCAA Division I Management Council, a policy-making body within the NCAA governance structure. He chaired the Division I-AA Governance Committee and formerly served on the NCAA Division I Business and Finance Cabinet, the Division I Governance Committee and the Division I Finance Committee. From 2002-04, Murphy chaired the Athletic Directors Association of the Southern Conference. He was part of Charlotte's successful bid to host the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championships in 1999 and 2000 and also served as Tournament Director of the first and second-round games of the 2005 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship in Charlotte.

Murphy is a past member of the Division I Football Issues Committee and Past-President of the Football Championship Subdivision Athletic Directors Association. He was also a member of the NCAA Task Force on Recruiting, an 18-member panel charged with changing the culture of recruiting in intercollegiate athletics, and currently serves on the NCAA's Fiscal Responsibility Oversight Group.

A licensed Certified Public Accountant and 1978 graduate of Davidson with a degree in economics, he earned a Master of Science degree in management from Georgia Tech in 1979. He worked from 1979-85 as an audit manager with the international public accounting firm of KPMG Peat Marwick in Atlanta with responsibility for financial statement audits of public and private companies with up to \$1 billion in assets.

Murphy has been active in the community since his return to Davidson. He is involved with Social Venture Partners - Charlotte, chairs the Board of Managers of the Lake Norman YMCA, the Board of Directors of the Charlotte Regional Sports Commission, served three years on the Board of the Charlotte Council for Children and three years on the Board of Directors of the Town of Davidson Youth Baseball League.

Murphy is married to Dr. Susan Roberts, a political science professor at Davidson, and his 24-year-old son, Matt, is a graduate of the University of North Carolina and works in advertising in Chapel Hill, N.C.

CAROL QUILLEN PRESIDENT



Carol Quillen, who was previously the vice president for international and interdisciplinary initiatives at Rice University, became the 18th president of Davidson College on August 1, 2011.

Quillen has had a long and distinguished career at Rice. She joined the faculty as an assistant professor of history in 1990, and she earned promotion to associate professor in 1996. From 2004 to 2008, she served as the first director of Rice's Boniuk Center for the Study and Advancement of Religious Tolerance, leading development of the center's new mission and shaping an agenda that helped distinguish the center from other organizations.

From 2006 to 2010, Quillen served as Rice's vice provost for academic affairs, focusing particularly on developing initiatives that cross academic schools, faculty diversity and faculty development, and resource development. During this time, she worked with faculty to develop and secure funding for a new Center for Asian Studies and a new Institute for Urban Research. She co-chaired the president's diversity task force, and instituted mentoring programs for junior faculty.

As vice president for international and interdisciplinary initiatives, Quillen was responsible for developing and implementing Rice's overall global strategy, which includes research partnerships, recruiting strategies, curricular revision and international opportunities for students. She also facilitates implementation of university-wide initiatives, including the Institute for Urban Research, Rice 360 (a global health effort), and collaborations with Baylor and other institutions within the Texas Medical Center.

James W. Crownover, chair of Rice University's Board of Trustees, said, "It's an honor for Rice that one of ours has been chosen to lead a place as respected as Davidson. She will work hard, and she will succeed there."

Quillen grew up in New Castle, Del., a small town where she says "it was second nature to support the community and look out for other people." A Presbyterian, she attended Quaker schools from pre-kindergarten through high school. She earned a B.A. degree in American history from the University of Chicago, graduating Phi Beta Kappa with special and general honors, then received a Ph.D. degree in European history from Princeton. A humanist whose academic interests include early modern European history, European intellectual history and gender studies, Quillen has written two books on Petrarch, as well as a number of scholarly articles, reviews and papers. She has received a number of teaching awards during her tenure at Rice.

Quillen's daughter, Caitlin, will be a first-year student at the University of North Carolina next fall. Quillen's husband, Ken Kennedy—a computer pioneer who founded the computer science program at Rice—died of pancreatic cancer in 2007. "His greatest gift to me, and to the Rice community, was in living the life he would have chosen," Quillen said. "That's something I think about in a very profound way every day."

At Davidson, Quillen succeeds Tom Ross '72, who announced in August 2010 that he would step down to become president of the University of North Carolina system in January 2011.
