THE HISTORY OF THE WILDCAT

On November 10, 1917, a small cohort of 22 football players traveled to Atlanta to represent Davidson College against Auburn, one of the most formidable teams in the South. The Plainsmen had massacred their first four opponents, outscoring teams, 141-6.

According to one account, they were "big, quick, and undefeated" and heavily favored in the day's matchup. Davidson was 2-4 and started a line averaging 20 pounds less.

Not surprisingly, Auburn dominated the game, outgaining the "Red and Black" 240 yards to Davidson's 91 yards. Astoundingly, Davidson pulled together an offensive attack through the efforts of running back A.R. "Buck" Flowers and quarterback Henry Spann, delivering a "bewildering array of forward passes."

Davidson defeated one of the most powerful teams in the South that day, 21-7, with scrappiness that captured the awe and respect of Atlanta sportswriters. They wrote of the "Wildcats" from Davidson College, whose small stature and ferocious style proved overwhelming. One account notes that Morgan Blake of the *Atlanta Journal* remarked of the Davidson team, "No other team ever put together in these United States of the same weight as Coach Fetzer's team could ever get the verdict over the flock of wild men from North Carolina."

The *Davidsonian* picked up on the nickname, and it has been used ever since, replacing former, milder references such as "Red and Black," "Presbyterians" and "Preachers."

Record at Davidson: 109-139

Drew Barrett enters his 12th season at the helm of the men's tennis program in 2018. He has compiled a 109-139 overall record (25-53 SoCon & 12-4 A-10) at Davidson in 11 years. Six times he has led the 'Cats to 10 or more wins in a season. Overall, he has collected 148 wins during his 17 years at Bradley and Davidson.

It was another strong season for Davidson in 2017 as Barrett guided the Wildcats to a 16-8 record overall and a 4-2 record in the Atlantic 10. He reached the 100-win mark with a 6-1 win vs. St. Bonaventure, Feb. 11. The 16 wins were the most in a regular season since 1994 when they had 16 as well. Helping Davidson reach 16 wins in 2017 were seven and four-match winning streaks, respectively, while going 8-2 on its home courts. In addition, the Wildcats rattled off a seven-match home win streak to tie the longest since a seven-match streak in 2013.

Barrett saw freshman Axel Fries become the program's first Atlantic 10 Freshman of the Year. Fries along with David Hager were named to the league's second team, while Shamael Chaudhry made the first team for the third consecutive year. J.B. Gough was the first Wildcat to earn a spot on the six-team all-academic team.

The 2016 season saw Davidson reach the 10-win mark for the fifth time under Barrett, going 11-10 overall. For the second year in a row, the 'Cats went 4-1 in A-10 play. They won four straight against Duquesne, Saint Joseph's, Dayton and George Mason, with three of those wins coming on the road. Davidson added one more win in the four straight at James Madison (4-2) for a season-best five-match win streak.

Barrett again saw two of his best players named to the Atlantic 10 all-conference team, as Shamael Chaudhry and Artem Khrapko were named to the first and second teams, respectively. It was the second year in a row Chaudhry was tabbed all-first team.

It was the beginning of a new era for the 2015 season and a very successful one at that as well. Barrett ushered Davidson into its first year of the Atlantic 10 by going 4-1 in league play to go with a 12-10 record overall. The Wildcats ran off a 10-match win streak during the regular season, the longest since a 12-match streak in 1997. During the streak the 'Cats netted all four of their A-10 wins on the year. They earned their first-ever Atlantic 10 win on the road with a 4-0 victory at Fordham. The Wildcats went on to earn the third seed in the A-10 Tournament.

The freshman duo of Shamael Chaudhry and Artem Khrapko were each named to the A-10 All-First Team after winning 25 singles matches between them at No. 1 and 2 positions. They combined to win the league's rookie performer of the week three times and performer of the week once. Fellow classmate David Hager also had a solid debut season, going 12-5 and winning the A-10 Rookie Performer of the Week twice. Five players in all won at least 10 singles matches on the year, led by Khrapko's team-high 15.

The 2015 season also saw Barrett help assist the program in building new locker room's for the players and a brand new 12-court outdoor tennis facility.

The 2014 season saw six underclassmen, including four freshmen, suit up and see regular playing time in the rotation. Davidson finished 5-18 overall and 2-8 in its last year in the SoCon. The 'Cats season came to an end in a 4-2 defeat to Chattanooga in the first round of the SoCon Tournament. Barrett saw a pair of Wildcats earn league all-academic team honors, with Evan Watkins and Alex Howard each earning a spot.

It was a successful campaign in 2013 as the Wildcats fashioned a 12-9 record, including an 8-4 record at home, and went an even 5-5 in SoCon action. The 12 wins were the most since the 2008 season when Davidson went 14-8. They also advanced to the quarterfinals in the SoCon Tournament with a 4-1 win against Wofford, before falling to Samford to end their season. Davidson rattled off a season-high six-match win streak in the early goings of 2013.

Barrett saw his most-highly recruited class at Davidson finish out their careers as Joe Schafer, Chris Mark and Kevin Moore had strong senior campaigns. The class, which was ranked the 25th best mid-major class in 2009, each earned SoCon honors their last year. The duo of Mark and Moore were named to the league's second team at No. 1 doubles, while Schafer earned the league's Don Bunch/Buddy Hartsell Sportsmanship Award. The Wildcats' No. 1 player, Schafer was also honored with SoCon Player of the Week, March 5.

The 2012 season saw Davidson go 7-14 overall and pick up a 3-7 record in league play. The Wildcats were 5-6 at home, including rattling off a season-best four-match win streak. Under the guidance of Barrett, senior Calum Gee and junior Joe Schafer were the first doubles pair in program history to earn a national ranking. The duo started the season ranked 19th in the nation. They finished with a 10-8 overall record at the No. 1 slot. In the Fall of 2011, the pair won the doubles title at The Racquet Club Collegiate Invitational in Midland, Texas, against some top ranked schools.

Barrett also saw his top freshman, Nicky Kunz, earn All-SoCon Freshman Team honors. The first-year player led the 'Cats with a 12-8 singles mark. It was the second time during Barrett's tenure he has had an all-league freshman team member as Schafer made the team in 2010.

On March 7, 2012, the Wildcats gave Barrett his 50th career win during his tenure at Davidson, scoring a 5-2 SoCon victory at Georgia Southern to open league play.

In 2011, the Wildcats compiled a 7-18 record overall, with two of those wins coming vs. the SoCon. Davidson as a team played seven matches that were decided by one point. The schedule also featured matches against nationally-ranked opponents N.C. State (57th), Clemson (53rd), USC-Upstate (60th), Harvard (73rd), Wake Forest (37th) and Radford (63rd)- all ranks based on what teams were when they played Davidson.

Despite a tough regular season, the 'Cats did advance to the quarterfinals of the SoCon Tournament when they scored a 4-1 win vs. seventh-seeded Wofford. Barrett also saw sophomore Joe Schafer earn second-team all-league honors at No. 1 singles, making it the third time under Barrett a player has earned first or second team honors.

The 2010 season saw Davidson hit the 10-win mark under Barrett for the second time in the past three years, finishing with a 10-11 record. The Wildcats just missed out on being one of the top-four teams to advance to the Southern Conference Tournament, sporting a 4-6 record. The 2010 season was highlighted by two win streak, first a four-match streak at the start of the season and then a five-match win streak in the middle that included league wins over Chattanooga, The Citadel and Georgia Southern. Five times Davidson blanked their opponents, 7-0. Barrett saw three of his players earn all-conference accolades, with senior Eric Noble and Joe Schafer earning a spot on the All-SoCon First Team in doubles, sophomore Calum Gee getting second team honors at No. 5 singles and Schafer being named to the league's all-freshman team.

The Wildcats went 7-17 overall and closed SoCon play at 2-8 during the 2009 campaign. They did open up the SoCon Tournament with a 4-3 win over Samford to advance to the quarterfinals for the eighth time in the past 10 years.

The 2008 season saw him guide the 'Cats to their first winning season since the 2001 campaign with a mark of 14-8. The 14 wins were the most since the 1999 team went 15-9. Of those 14 wins, 10 of them came at the friendly confines of the Covington Tennis

Courts where the team finished 10-2. Davidson also sported a 5-4 mark in SoCon play, while advancing to the quarterfinals of the SoCon tournament.

In Barrett's first season, 2007, he led the Wildcats to an 8-16 overall mark his first season and a 2-7 SoCon record. He also guided the Wildcats into the quarterfinals of the SoCon tournament.

Barrett came to Davidson by way of Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., where he was the head coach of the Bradley Braves men's tennis team for five years. A former assistant coach at DePaul and Illinois-Chicago, Barrett inherited the Braves' program that had won just one conference match in 33 tries before his arrival and helped build them into a competitive team in the Missouri Valley Conference.

In 2006, Barrett led the Braves to their first MVC Tournament semifinal birth since 1993 after garnering the program's first main-draw victory in the conference meet in the dual-format era. The Braves finished with an overall record of 7-13 and 2-5 in the MVC.

Two of his players became the school's first MVC individual tournament champions, claiming the No. 1 doubles crown, while another secured his fourth all-conference recognition and earned his third MVC Scholar-Athlete honor. In all, seven players earned MVC Scholar-Athlete recognition in 2006.

The 2003 and 2004 spring seasons were two of the most successful in Bradley's history. Barrett guided the Braves to a 3-5 conference mark in the spring of 2003 and a ranking of 13th in the final Central Region ITA Poll. Then in the spring of 2004, the Braves went 10-10 overall with a 4-4 mark in MVC play. The four MVC victories were a school-record since round-robin regular-season play began in the mid-'90s. He coached an MVC Freshman of the Year in 2003 and had the MVC's No. 1 singles all-conference player in 2004.

Barrett also coached a winner of Bradley's highest athletic honor, the Watonga Award. During his five-year tenure at Bradley, the Braves finished higher in the regular-season standings than any team since 1989.

Before his head coaching duties at Bradley, Barrett was an assistant coach at DePaul during the 1999-2000 campaign, where he helped guide the Blue Demons from a ranking of 125th nationally to as high as 48th in a season termed as the most successful in school history. The Blue Demons won 14 dual matches, with five of those wins coming over nationally-ranked teams.

A graduate of the University of Illinois-Chicago, Barrett was involved in junior tennis in the Chicago suburbs for nearly a decade. Most recently, he served as Junior Tennis Coordinator for the Rush-Copley Healthplex, in Aurora and as Director of Junior Development at the South Barrington Tennis Club.

Barrett and his wife Mandy, formerly Mandy Alaks, reside in Cornelius with their two children.

Entering their 12th year under the guidance of head coach Drew Barrett, the Wildcats will enter the 2018 campaign in its fourth year in the Atlantic 10 after a very strong campaign last year.

"It was a successful season for us last year," said Barrett. "We are looking forward to continuing that great success we had and build on it for this coming season. We always look forward to the challenge of a new season and I think the players are excited for this year, especially our senior class, as we look to take the next step in advancing in the league tournament."

The 2018 team returns a majority of its lineup from last year's 16-8 season with a mark of 4-2 in A-10 matches. It was the team's third straight four-win league season. In addition, it was the fourth time in the past five years the Wildcats collected 10 or more wins in a season. The 16 wins were the most in the regular season since 1994 when they had 16 as well. The 'Cats had 18 overall in 1998, earning three of those victories in the Southern Conference Tournament.

This year's club will feature the return of all eight letterwinners, including all five starters, as the Wildcats are set up for a great 2018 season.

SINGLES

Davidson picked up an outstanding 89 singles wins in 135 matches last year and netted 23 of those victories against A-10 opponents. The 89 wins were the most during the Barrett era, with Davidson earning 78 being the previous high in 2008.

Five players reached the double-digit wins mark, led by 18 from Axel Fries and a career-high 16 from David Hager. For the third year in a row, Artem Khrapko reached double figures with 12, and enters the season the first singles ranked player (120th) under Barrett. He is also the first singles ranked Wildcat since Hall of Famer Jon Pastel '98 was 40th in the nation in 1998.

• **Senior David Hager:** Named to the A-10 All-Second Team ... registered a career year by going 16-7 in singles to finish second on the team in wins at No. 2 ... opened the last season by winning first seven straight matches to set a personal best ... the 16 wins pushed career record to an impressive 41-17 overall ... all 16 wins came at No. 2 singles.

• **Senior Shamael Chaudhry:** Enjoyed another strong season a year ago, earning a spot on the A-10 All-First Team for the third straight year ... matched personal best with 12 singles wins at No. 1, going 12-11 ... had a 4-2 conference record ... registered winning streaks of six and four, respectively, last year.

• **Senior Artem Khrapko:** One of five Wildcats to reach double-digit wins in singles with a 12-8 record, playing positions 2-5 ... registered a 6-4 mark at No. 3, while going 3-0 at No. 5 ... closed out the season on a three-match win streak ... went 4-1 in

matches that went three sets.

• **Senior Jack Riazzi:** Played two singles matches, splitting them ... earned a 6-2, 6-0 win vs. N.C. A&T at No. 6.

• **Sophomore Axel Fries:** Had a stellar first year, taking home the Atlantic 10 Freshman of the Year honors to become the first Wildcat in program history to earn the award ... was named to the league's all-second team ... won A-10 Rookie of the Week a program-best five times ... given the team's Rob Palmer MVP award ... combined for 33 singles and doubles wins, going a team-best 18-5 in singles play at No. 3-5 positions ... got eight wins each at No. 3 and 5 positions, respectively, running off a team season-high 12-match win streak.

• **Sophomore Kotaro Horiuchi:** Did not play an official singles match as a freshman.

• **Sophomore Thomas Mason:** Given the team's Most Improved Award ... named to the A-10 Commissioner's Honor Roll for both the Fall and Spring semesters ... in first season, saw action in 11 singles matches by going 6-5 at No. 5 and 6 ... tallied a 3-2 A-10 record ... went 5-5 at No. 6 singles.

• **Sophomore Matthew Rose:** Did not play an official singles match as a freshman.

NEWCOMERS

Davidson added five freshmen to the roster for added depth.

• **Kevin Huang:** Four-year letterwinner at East Chapel Hill ... earned all-regional three times ... PAC-C Conference Player of the Year in 2016 and 2017 ... two-time team MVP (2016 & 2017) ... finished career with a 66-17 record, including a 20-11 mark during senior prep season.

• **Alexander Loope:** Played No. 1 singles position at Norfolk Collegiate School ... VISA State Player of the Year in 2017 ... first-team all-state singles three times ... team co-captain junior and senior years ... Virginian Pilot Male Tennis Player of the Year ... Norfolk Collegiate 2016-2017 Male Athlete of the Year ... named MVP of team all four years.

• **Douglas Macintosh:** Four-year letterwinner at Merchiston Castle School ... played for school and Scotland at the World School finals in Qatar 2015 and Brazil 2017 ... reached quarterfinal of British grade one winter nationals ... won five from six singles matches and five from six doubles at school national finals.

• **Camden Mazzoni:** No. 1 singles player during prep career ... finished 24-1 in singles during senior season and had a 45-3 career record ... only player to win a MIAA South Championship at Dennis Yarmouth ... Boston Globe All-Scholastic (two-time), Boston Herald All-scholastic (two-time), MIAA South Individual Champion (two-time), MIAA state finalist, Atlantic Coast League All-Star (two-time).

• **Yash Parikh:** Played No. 1 position and earned four letters during prep career ... two-time individual state champion

(sophomore and senior seasons) ... first player to win high school invitational all four years ... as senior, won the state individual title and went undefeated ... named Arizona Athlete of the Year by AZ Central newspaper as a senior.

DOUBLES

Davidson's doubles teams tallied 39 wins in 2017, getting 10 of those against the Atlantic 10. The 39 wins were the most since collecting 32 in 2011. The 'Cats rotated through 11 doubles combinations.

• **No. 1 position:** The Wildcats return half of their top doubles team of Fries and Gough, with Gough having graduated ... the duo went a team-best 15-6 at the top spot and 5-1 in A-10 matches ... the duo had a team-high eight-match winning streak in the middle of the season.

• **No. 2 position:** The main No. 2 team of Chaudhry and Riazzi return after going 7-6 together (2-2 in A-10) ... Chaudhry also teamed up with Ricky Saad (2-0) and Hager (3-1) to earn another five wins, going a combined 5-1 with them at No. 2.

• **No. 3 position:** The Wildcats' used seven different teams at No. 3, combining to go 12-7 a year ago ... Hager and Khrapko played seven matches, going 3-4 ... Khrapko also scored two wins each with Saad and Jack Riazzi, while Riazzi teamed with Saad to go 2-0.

SCHEDULE

Davidson will open its 2018 season with a four-match homestand, starting with a match against 20th ranked South Carolina, Jan. 22. The Wildcats will also play host to Gardner-Webb, Presbyterian and East Carolina from Jan. 25-Feb. 3. Overall, six of their first eight matches will be at home. Last year the Wildcats went 8-2 on its home courts, running off a seven-match win streak which was the longest since a seven-match streak in 2013.

Other non-conference home matches feature Wingate, Radford, N.C. Central, Navy (first meeting ever), Appalachian State and College of Charleston.

Atlantic 10 play begins on the road against Duquesne, March 5, in a neutral site match in Lakeland, Fla. Davidson will face Saint Joseph's at home, March 11, before going back to the road for matches against George Mason and George Washington, March 24-25. A year ago the Wildcats collected a 7-0 win over the Hawks and a 4-2 win against the Patriots of George Mason.

Their final league match will be at home, April 22 against Richmond. The series is tied at 12-all dating back to 1988. The 'Cats have dropped their last three matches vs. the Spiders.

The Atlantic 10 Tournament takes place April 26-29 in Orlando, Fla, at USTA National Campus. Last year saw VCU take home the championship title for the first time since 2013 and stop the GW Colonials run of three straight, third year in a row and sixth overall since 2011.

Oliver Roddey, Hall Class of 1989-90

Roddey won more state tennis championships than any other male player in North Carolina. He was a junior champion at age 14 and later ranked No. 1 in the South for men. He played No. 1 at Davidson four years and won the Southern Conference singles and doubles championships in 1950. He's one of the original members of the North Carolina Tennis Hall of Fame. Roddey was undefeated in North Carolina tournaments (1947-52) and the first North Carolinian named to the Junior Davis Cup Team in 1948.

Archibald W. Archer, Hall Class of 1990-91

Archer '47 is legendary for his accomplishments in tennis. As a junior he led the Wildcats to an 8-0 record. He played No. 1 and led Davidson to a 13-4 record as a senior. He's been prominent on the national tennis scene since he graduated, winning a number of championships in his age bracket. One of his most remarkable achievements came in 1974 when Archer defeated Bobby Riggs for the National 60 Clay Court Championship and then teamed with Riggs for the doubles title. He was inducted into the North Carolina Tennis Hall of Fame in 1977. Like many students of his day, Archer was a two-sport athlete and played football.



P. Whitlock Cobb, Hall Class of 1989-90

Cobb, one of Davidson's finest multi-sport athletes, was named Southern Conference Athlete of the Year in 1950 and is a member of the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame. He was a four-year starter in basketball and captain of the 1950 team. He was a four-year starter in tennis and teamed with Bo Roddey to win the Southern Conference doubles championship in 1950. Cobb also earned four letters in track, giving him a total of 12 varsity letters.

Charles Williams, Hall Class of 2000-01

Mike Williams, considered by his peers as the best athlete at Davidson of his era, was a multi-sport star for the Wildcat, participating in basketball, football and tennis. In basketball, he played four seasons (1944, '47, '48, '49) and was co-captain for two years. In football he played three seasons (1943, '47, '48) and was a member of the tennis team two years (1947, '48). He was named all-state in basketball and was a third team All-Southern Conference selection. His Davidson career was interrupted by a tour of duty with the Army Air Corps from 1944-46. At Davidson, he was a member of the Student Council, junior class president, president of Kappa Sigma and was named to Who's Who Among American College Students.



Harry Fogleman, Hall Class of 2001-02

Fogleman was Davidson's tennis coach during one of its most successful eras, posting a record of 175 wins against only 69 defeats in 11 seasons with the Wildcats. His teams won the Southern Conference championship six of seven years from 1965-71 despite not having a single scholarship player. As a head coach at Duke, Cincinnati and Davidson, his overall record was 390 wins against just 133 losses. Fogleman starred as a player at Duke and played professionally after graduating. In 1971, he was honored by the National Tennis Education Foundation as the nation's "outstanding teacher for making the greatest contribution to tennis in the United States." He served on five USLTA committees and designed rackets for a sporting goods manufacturer. Fogleman also guided Davidson's soccer teams from 1962 until 1972, posting a record of 81-33-8. He guided the Wildcats to Southern Conference championships in 1970 and '71. Fogleman owns the distinction as the only Davidson coach to win two conference championships in the same school year (1970-71).



Jon Pastel, Hall Class of 2008-09

Pastel '98 was a two-time Southern Conference Singles Champion and is the only Davidson tennis player to earn All-SoCon honors in all four seasons as a Wildcat. He posted a career record of 108-32, including a 17-4 mark as a senior, on his way to being named SoCon Player of the Year in both the 1996 and 1997 seasons, the only player in school history to win the award and one of three in conference history to earn multiple Player of the Year honors. In 1997, he became the first Wildcat to reach the NCAA Tournament. He achieved a national ranking as high as 30th during his career and earned the Tommy Peters Award in 1998 for his outstanding athletic accomplishments while at Davidson.



Jeff Frank, Hall Class of 2011-12

Frank spent 34 years as the men's head tennis coach and won more games than any coach in Davidson history in any sport (541-319-1). He was the Southern Conference Coach of the Year five times and compiled 29 winning records in his 34 seasons. He was inducted into the North Carolina Tennis Hall of Fame in 1996. He was given the SoCon Distinguished Service Award in 2006, and only former wrestling coach Charlie Parker (40 years) had a longer coaching tenure at Davidson. Frank took over the tennis program in 1973 and led the 'Cats to a 23-2 record and a SoCon title. The Wildcats logged 20-win seasons under Frank nine times, including four in a row from 1985-88. He was also the Big South Coach of the Year both seasons Davidson competed in that league. Frank passed away in May of 2009.

Jeff Frank retired as one of the most successful coaches in all of Davidson sports. For 34 years he was the staple of the men's tennis program as he concluded with a record of astonishing 541 wins against 319 defeats. Frank had 29 winning seasons, was named the Southern Conference coach of the year four different times and nine times the Wildcats posted 20-win seasons during Frank's tenure, including four straight from 1985-88. In addition, Frank led the Wildcats to SoCon titles in 1973, '76 and '97.

A '66 graduate of Davidson, Frank was inducted into the North Carolina tennis Hall of Fame in November of 1996.



Fogleman was Davidson's tennis coach during one of its most successful eras, posting a record of 175 wins against only 69 defeats in 11 seasons with the Wildcats (1962-72). His teams won the Southern Conference championships six of seven years from 1965-71 despite not having a single scholarship player. As a head coach at Duke, Florida, Cincinnati and Davidson, his overall record was 390-133.

In 2002, he was inducted into the Davidson Athletics Hall of Fame.
